Thank you for contacting the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission (ACQSC) to respond to this consultation.

ACQSC have no objection to the release of "the name of the agency" and "The OAIC reference number associated with the reported breach" as proposed in your email.

We do have some administrative questions:

We appreciate that the release of such information may support greater transparency and ease of access. However, we would like to understand what impact OAIC expect to come from releasing a list of their complaint codes in bulk. The proposal is such that, OAIC will release reference numbers from 1 January 2020 to 5 July 2024 into the public sphere codes, does OAIC predict an increase in FOI applications to agencies using this information? Does OAIC have a process in place for tracking effects of such decisions?

Does OAIC use reference numbers for early or voluntary notifications where a breach is yet to be officially determined? Or is this number only assigned/used with agency confirmed breaches? For some agencies, depending on the use of the reference number, releasing these two data points (identity and reference number) may have the effect of reducing agency willingness to transparently engage with OAIC on any lesser matters likely to accrue a reference number. (This may have the effect of eroding agency trust and transparency with OAIC).

We note that Legal Services has sought the views of \$22 about this matter and we would like to defer to \$ 22 for the agency's position or approach going forward about the release of the names of agencies/organisations. While we see value in publishing names of entities notifying the OAIC (which may be the practice of other jurisdictions), this would be a significant departure from our previous position that would require a considered and consultative approach.

With this specific request, we consider that there are some complexities and factors that weigh against disclosure. We have outlined these below:

1. The OAIC has represented to reporting entities that we collect the information in confidence, particularly any information provided in Part 2 of the form. The NDB form currently states:

Part two of the form is optional... and you may request that it be held in confidence by the OAIC. And further - The OAIC will respect the confidence of commercially or operationally sensitive information provided voluntarily in support of a data breach notification, and will only disclose this information after consulting with you, and with your agreement or where required by law.

Part 2 of the form includes "the number of people affected (range)" which has already been released to the applicant; releasing the name of the agencies, in addition to information previously supplied, will in effect, also release information expected by entities to be kept confidential by the OAIC.

- Releasing the names of the agencies, could reasonably be expected to have substantial adverse effect on the operations of the OAIC and/or the objective of the NDB scheme to promote notification to affected individuals at risk of serious harm as:
  - a. Releasing information provided by agencies in Part 2 of the NDB form (as outlined above) is likely to affect the willingness of agencies to voluntarily provide this information either upfront in the NDB form or in response to our preliminary inquiries. The only alternative to seeking this information is to issue a compulsory information-gathering notice under s 26WU of the Privacy Act (the delegation currently sits at SESB1 or above), which is time consuming and impact our ability to respond to an incident efficiently
  - b. Compliance with the NDB scheme generally relies on good faith of regulated entities, including agencies, to undertake assessments of data breaches and notify the OAIC. Releasing the names of the agencies may result in under-reporting of data breaches under the NDB scheme by agencies and organisations, and reduced notifications to affected individuals. This would undermine the objectives the scheme to enable individuals to take agency and take positive steps to minimise risk of harm as a result of an incident
  - c. Specifically, the NDB team has observed instances that may indicate underreporting or reluctance to report data breaches by agencies, or that agencies take a longer time to notify of an incident. The OAIC has taken

- steps to increase engagement with agencies to promote timely notification and appropriate assessment while we are seeing a general increase in agency notifications, it is not at the level we would expect given the amount of personal information held by agencies. Releasing the names of all the agencies in the document will likely have an adverse effect on the current trajectory of increasing notifications.
- d. Notification to the OAIC, at times, enables the OAIC's oversight of the notifying agency's assessment of the incident and whether notification of the incident to individuals ought to occur. Notification to affected individuals is not required in all data breach instances notified to the OAIC (outlined further in the points below).
- 3. The following data breach notifications in the document bundle are secondary matters, where an agency may not have an obligation to notify the OAIC because an exception under s 26WM applies and so the notification is likely to have been voluntarily made:

Thank you \$22 for discussing the internal review request with me this afternoon. As discussed, we have received a request for IR for decision made in relation to NDB scheme (the marked up documents are attached).

The original decision exempted material under s.47E(d) on the basis that its disclosure could reasonably be expected to have substantial adverse effect on the operations of the agency and it was not in the public interest to release this information. I am considering this position further.

In particular the FOI Guidelines provide that

6.14 The test requires the decision maker to assess the likelihood of the predicted or forecast event, effect or damage occurring after disclosure of a document.

6.15 The use of the word 'could' is less stringent than 'would' and requires analysis of the reasonable expectation rather than the certainty of an event, effect or damage occurring. It may be a reasonable expectation that an effect has occurred, is presently occurring, or could occur in the future.

6.16 The mere risk, allegation, possibility, or chance of prejudice does not qualify as a reasonable expectation. There must be, based on reasonable grounds, at least a real, significant or material possibility of prejudice, if they can be included without disclosing exempt material (s 26, see Part 3).

It would assist me to further consider this issue if you could make further submissions on the real, significant or material possibility of the prejudice occurring (i.e. is there any evidence that disclosure particularly of the name of agencies would effect the willingness of agencies to report)

In addition, to meeting the above test, I must also consider the public interest factors in deciding whether or not to release the material. It would also assist if you could consider any public interest factors against disclosure of this information that may be relevant. To ensure compliance with statutory timeframes could you please provide any further submissions by cob next Friday 13 September 2024.

I will further consider whether internal consultation with \$ 22 may be appropriate. I will let you know if this occurs.

Dear Office of the Australian Information Commissioner,

Please pass this on to the person who conducts Freedom of Information reviews.

I am writing to request an internal review of the Office of the Australian Information Commissioner's handling of my FOI request 'Government data breach reports from 2020' (FOIREQ24/00352).

I am seeking a review on the following grounds:

- 1. I disagree with the decision-maker's decision to redact material on the basis that disclosure would or could reasonably be expected to have a substantial adverse effect on the proper and efficient conduct of the OAIC's operations. Please refer to the decision-maker's statements.

  i. It is possible that disclosing this information would encourage the OAIC to act more quickly, as it would be subject to public scrutiny.
- ii. The decision-maker's concern that government agencies might be reticent to provide information if their identities are revealed is unfounded, as the legal obligation to report eligible data breaches would remain unchanged.
- iii. The decision-maker implies that disclosure could discourage government agencies from providing voluntary information beyond the minimum requirements. The reliance on voluntary information is misplaced. The FOI Act aims to ensure access to information, not incentivise voluntary disclosure. The public's right to know should not be contingent on the goodwill of government agencies. Furthermore, the OAIC can address any concerns about voluntary disclosure through other means, such as providing guidance or incentives for comprehensive reporting.
- iv. If there was an actual impact on the proper and efficient conduct of the OAIC's operations, it would not rise to the level of 'substantial and adverse'.
- 2. The decision-makers application of the public interest test was flawed for the following reasons:
- 2.1 The decision-maker failed to consider the following factors in favour of disclosure:
- i. Disclosure would allow the public to make better-informed decisions about their interactions with government agencies. Currently, there is no way an individual can consider an individual government agency's track record of data privacy and security when deciding whether to share their personal information or not. I note that the OAIC publishes aggregate data in its Notifiable Data Breaches Report. However, the public interest in understanding the specific risks associated with individual agencies is not adequately served by aggregate data alone.
- ii. Disclosure would allow or assist inquiry into possible deficiencies in the conduct or administration of an agency. [FOI Guidelines 6.231] iii. Disclosure could reveal deficiencies in privacy legislation. [FOI Guidelines 6.231]
- 2.2 The decision-maker incorrectly considered the following factors that do not favour disclosure: A) The decision maker states, "Disclosure would have an adverse effect on the OAIC's proper and efficient operations relating to receiving full and frank disclosure of actual or suspected data breaches from Australian Government agencies."
- i. The frankness and candour argument in the FOI context has been discussed in numerous previous decisions of the Information Commissioner, the AAT, and the courts. Public servants 'are expected to operate within a framework that encourages open access to information and recognises Government information as a national resource to be managed for public purposes'. The FOI Guidelines refer to the FOI Act recognising that Australia's democracy is strengthened when the public is empowered to participate in Government processes and scrutinise Government activities. The FOI Guidelines further state that 'In this setting, transparency of the work of public servants should be the accepted operating environment and fears about a lessening of frank and candid advice correspondingly diminished.'
- B) The decision maker states, "Disclosure would undermine the confidence and trust in the OAIC as a regulator to deal with matters it regulates in a sensitive and timely manner."
- i. 'Access to the document could result in embarrassment to the Commonwealth Government, or cause a loss of confidence in the Commonwealth Government' is an irrelevant factor as described

in s 11B(4) of the FOI Act and therefore was incorrectly considered in the public interest test.

- C) The decision maker states, "Disclosure would reasonably be expected to delay the OAIC's consideration of, and ability to, take further regulatory action in response to an eligible data breach if entities are reluctant to provide timely, full and frank information if their respective identities may be disclosed."
- i) As previously stated, government agencies should start with the assumption that public servants are obliged by their position to always provide robust and frank advice and that obligation will not be diminished by the transparency of government activities.
- D) The decision maker states, "In case of a breach which meets the requisite threshold of 'serious harm', entities regulated by the Privacy Act are required to notify individuals affected by an eligible data breach of the nature of the breach, inclusive of the type of information captured in their reporting to the OAIC."
- i. This is not relevant to the public interest test.
- ii. I note that the decision-maker explains that individuals directly affected by data breaches are notified of the breach, however, the public interest extends beyond individual impact. Data breaches have systemic consequences, such as undermining public trust in government agencies or exposing vulnerabilities in critical infrastructure. By disclosing agency names, the public can engage in informed discussions about these broader implications and advocate for policy changes to improve data security.
- 2.3 The public interest in transparency and accountability outweighs any potential harm to the OAIC's operations. Given the high level of public concern about data breaches and the importance of government transparency, the public interest in knowing which agencies are responsible for these breaches is significant. This interest outweighs any speculative harm to the OAIC's operations. This information is crucial for informed public debate, holding agencies accountable, and assessing the effectiveness of government data protection measures. The OAIC's role is to protect the privacy of Australians, and this includes providing them with the information they need to make informed decisions about their interactions with government agencies.
- 3. The decision-maker states, "As outlined in my decisions above, in my view based on the information before me at this time, I have concerns that disclosure of the nature and specific details of the information in a public forum such as via Right to Know, is likely to prejudice the abilities of these agencies in responding to the data breaches, and the OAIC's ability to gather similar information to assess these breaches in the future."
- i) The forum of an FOI request is irrelevant to the decision to deny access to information. FOI applicants have the right to publish disclosed information, and the disclosed documents become accessible to the public via the OAIC's disclosure log.

I am prepared to escalate this matter to the AAT if necessary. Therefore, I respectfully request that this internal review be conducted by a more senior decision-maker, such as a Principal or Senior Officer.







I am writing to provide an update on the below matter, for which I am the decision maker. A decision is due today, 25 September 2024.

### Consultation

As noted by Emily below, we decided to consult with affected agencies. We wrote to 87 government agencies, seeking their views on the disclosure of their agency name and OAIC reference number(s) in addition to the material already disclosed in the primary decision (00352-Bundle.pdf (oaic.gov.au)).

Of those agencies:

- 14 objected to release of their name and reference numbers for some or all of the NDBs:
- 61 advised that they did not object to release of their name and reference number(s);
   and
- 12 did not respond.

### **Decision**

In making the decision, I considered the submissions of affected agencies along with the important information and context provided by the NDB team – thank you 222 and 322 Most agencies who objected did so on the basis that either the data breach itself or some of the information being linked to them (being the details in the right columns already released) was provided on a voluntary basis, and that they would not be able to be as forthcoming and provide such detail in the future if it would be shared with the public.

I therefore have made the decision not to release an agency's name and OAIC reference where that agency has objected, and:

- the agency was not required to notify the OAIC of that particular data breach (for example, where an exemption applies or where serious harm was not likely to occur);
   or
- the agency had requested that non-mandatory information be kept confidential by the OAIC (that information, such as number of affected individuals, would be linked

to the agency due to those columns of the document being released both in the original decision and internal review).

Please find attached a redacted version of the document that I propose to release to the applicant. I note that the document to be released will also be placed on the OAIC's disclosure log within 10 working days after access is provided to the applicant.

Thank you for your input into this matter. I have further considered your emails in addition to below submission from \$22\$. I have also considered the submissions made by the applicant in relation to this matter.

### Government agency names / OAIC reference number

Three main submissions have been made in relation to redaction of agency names under s.47E(d) of the FOI Act. These are:

Release of the names may circumvent the intention of the scheme;

- Compliance with NDB scheme relies on the good will of agencies; and
- Release of names may result in underreporting by agencies.

To meet the conditional exemption in s.47E(d) it must be demonstrated that there would or could reasonably be expected to have a substantial adverse effect on the proper and efficient conduct of the OAIC's operations. The FOI Guidelines at paragraph 6.16

6.16 The mere risk, allegation, possibility, or chance of prejudice does not qualify as a reasonable expectation. There must be, based on reasonable grounds, at least a real, significant or material possibility of prejudice

, if they can be included without disclosing exempt material (s 26, see Part 3).

Based on the submissions and further discussions with line area, I do not consider there is sufficient information available **at this time** to demonstrate with reasonable expectation that the release of agency names would result in underreporting by agencies or that compliance of the scheme relies on the good will of agencies. Compliance with the NDB scheme does not rely on the good will of agencies, it does rely on agencies complying with their legal obligations under the NDB Scheme. In addition, there is no evidence to suggest that the release of agency names would result in underreporting by agencies subject to the NDB scheme. The line area has conducted an audit of one commonwealth agency which suggested underreporting by that agency under the NDB Scheme. But there is no further evidence to demonstrate that this underreporting is more widespread or that releasing the names of agencies with high level data about a data breach under FOI would contribute to underreporting.

### **Consultation with affected agencies**

I propose to consult with the affected agencies to seek their views on the disclosure of this information. There are potentially 99 government agencies affected and a single email bcc to each agency seeking their views will be sent today **Wednesday 18 September 2024**. Responses will be due by lunchtime **Monday 23 September 2024**. Any responses will be considered prior to the decision being finalised.

### Risk of deemed decision

The internal review decision is **due Wednesday 25 September 2024**. This is a complex review with wider implications for the OAIC and the NDB team. There is currently on 2 days for decision making following return of consultation responses in relation to this matter which may not be sufficient. The only extension of time available to internal review is under s.54D of the FOI Act (application to the OAIC) which is not available in relation to this matter due the internal policy which prevents applications to the OAIC for extension of time. We note that this matter has been requested via right to know website. We will continue to work towards the due date noting that an additional internal resource may be made available to the FOI processing team but given the current due date this may not assist in relation to this matter. I will provide you an additional update early next week.

We note that Legal Services has sought the views of \$22 about this matter and we would like to defer to \$22 for the agency's position or approach going forward about the release of the names of agencies/organisations. While we see value in publishing names of entities notifying the OAIC (which may be the practice of other jurisdictions), this would be a significant departure from our previous position that would require a considered and consultative approach.

With this specific request, we consider that there are some complexities and factors that weigh against disclosure. We have outlined these below:

 The OAIC has represented to reporting entities that we collect the information in confidence, particularly any information provided in Part 2 of the form. The NDB form currently states:

Part two of the form is optional... and you may request that it be held in confidence by the OAIC. And further - The OAIC will respect the confidence of commercially or operationally sensitive information provided voluntarily in


support of a data breach notification, and will only disclose this information after consulting with you, and with your agreement or where required by law.

Part 2 of the form includes "the number of people affected (range)" which has already been released to the applicant; releasing the name of the agencies, in addition to information previously supplied, will in effect, also release information expected by entities to be kept confidential by the OAIC.

- 2. Releasing the names of the agencies, could reasonably be expected to have substantial adverse effect on the operations of the OAIC and/or the objective of the NDB scheme to promote notification to affected individuals at risk of serious harm as:
  - a. Releasing information provided by agencies in Part 2 of the NDB form (as outlined above) is likely to affect the willingness of agencies to voluntarily provide this information either upfront in the NDB form or in response to our preliminary inquiries. The only alternative to seeking this information is to issue a compulsory information-gathering notice under s 26WU of the Privacy Act (the delegation currently sits at SESB1 or above), which is time consuming and impact our ability to respond to an incident efficiently
  - b. Compliance with the NDB scheme generally relies on good faith of regulated entities, including agencies, to undertake assessments of data breaches and notify the OAIC. Releasing the names of the agencies may result in under-reporting of data breaches under the NDB scheme by agencies and organisations, and reduced notifications to affected individuals. This would undermine the objectives the scheme to enable individuals to take agency and take positive steps to minimise risk of harm as a result of an incident
  - c. Specifically, the NDB team has observed instances that may indicate underreporting or reluctance to report data breaches by agencies, or that agencies take a longer time to notify of an incident. The OAIC has taken steps to increase engagement with agencies to promote timely notification and appropriate assessment while we are seeing a general increase in agency notifications, it is not at the level we would expect given the amount of personal information held by agencies. Releasing the names of all the agencies in the document will likely have an adverse effect on the current trajectory of increasing notifications.
  - d. Notification to the OAIC, at times, enables the OAIC's oversight of the notifying agency's assessment of the incident and whether notification of the incident to individuals ought to occur. Notification to affected individuals is not required in all data breach instances notified to the OAIC (outlined further in the points below).

3. The following data breach notifications in the document bundle are secondary matters, where an agency may not have an obligation to notify the OAIC because an exception under s 26WM applies and so the notification is likely to have been voluntarily made:

Thank you \$22 for discussing the internal review request with me this afternoon. As discussed, we have received a request for IR for decision made in relation to NDB scheme (the marked up documents are attached).

The original decision exempted material under s.47E(d) on the basis that its disclosure could reasonably be expected to have substantial adverse effect on the operations of the agency and it was not in the public interest to release this information. I am considering this position further.

In particular the FOI Guidelines provide that

6.14 The test requires the decision maker to assess the likelihood of the predicted or forecast event, effect or damage occurring after disclosure of a document.

6.15 The use of the word 'could' is less stringent than 'would' and requires analysis of the reasonable expectation rather than the certainty of an event, effect or damage occurring. It may be a reasonable expectation that an effect has occurred, is presently occurring, or could occur in the future.

6.16 The mere risk, allegation, possibility, or chance of prejudice does not qualify as a reasonable expectation. There must be, based on reasonable grounds, at least a real, significant or material possibility of prejudice, if they can be included without disclosing exempt material (s 26, see Part 3).

It would assist me to further consider this issue if you could make further submissions on the real, significant or material possibility of the prejudice occurring (i.e. is there any evidence that disclosure particularly of the name of agencies would effect the willingness of agencies to report)

In addition, to meeting the above test, I must also consider the public interest factors in deciding whether or not to release the material. It would also assist if you could consider any public interest factors against disclosure of this information that may be relevant. To ensure compliance with statutory timeframes could you please provide any further submissions by cob next Friday 13 September 2024.

I will further consider whether internal consultation with \$22 may be appropriate. I will let you know if this occurs.

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Dear Office of the Australian Information Commissioner,

Please pass this on to the person who conducts Freedom of Information reviews.

I am writing to request an internal review of the Office of the Australian Information Commissioner's handling of my FOI request 'Government data breach reports from 2020' (FOIREQ24/00352).

I am seeking a review on the following grounds:

- 1. I disagree with the decision-maker's decision to redact material on the basis that disclosure would or could reasonably be expected to have a substantial adverse effect on the proper and efficient conduct of the OAIC's operations. Please refer to the decision-maker's statements.
- i. It is possible that disclosing this information would encourage the OAIC to act more quickly, as it would be subject to public scrutiny.
- ii. The decision-maker's concern that government agencies might be reticent to provide information if their identities are revealed is unfounded, as the legal obligation to report eligible data breaches would remain unchanged.
- iii. The decision-maker implies that disclosure could discourage government agencies from providing voluntary information beyond the minimum requirements. The reliance on voluntary information is misplaced. The FOI Act aims to ensure access to information, not incentivise voluntary disclosure. The public's right to know should not be contingent on the goodwill of

government agencies. Furthermore, the OAIC can address any concerns about voluntary disclosure through other means, such as providing guidance or incentives for comprehensive reporting.

iv. If there was an actual impact on the proper and efficient conduct of the OAIC's operations, it would not rise to the level of 'substantial and adverse'.

- 2. The decision-makers application of the public interest test was flawed for the following reasons:
- 2.1 The decision-maker failed to consider the following factors in favour of disclosure:
- i. Disclosure would allow the public to make better-informed decisions about their interactions with government agencies. Currently, there is no way an individual can consider an individual government agency's track record of data privacy and security when deciding whether to share their personal information or not. I note that the OAIC publishes aggregate data in its Notifiable Data Breaches Report. However, the public interest in understanding the specific risks associated with individual agencies is not adequately served by aggregate data alone.
- ii. Disclosure would allow or assist inquiry into possible deficiencies in the conduct or administration of an agency. [FOI Guidelines 6.231] iii. Disclosure could reveal deficiencies in privacy legislation. [FOI Guidelines 6.231]
- 2.2 The decision-maker incorrectly considered the following factors that do not favour disclosure: A) The decision maker states, "Disclosure would have an adverse effect on the OAIC's proper and efficient operations relating to receiving full and frank disclosure of actual or suspected data breaches from Australian Government agencies."
- i. The frankness and candour argument in the FOI context has been discussed in numerous previous decisions of the Information Commissioner, the AAT, and the courts. Public servants 'are expected to operate within a framework that encourages open access to information and recognises Government information as a national resource to be managed for public purposes'. The FOI Guidelines refer to the FOI Act recognising that Australia's democracy is strengthened when the public is empowered to participate in Government processes and scrutinise Government activities. The FOI Guidelines further state that 'In this setting, transparency of the work of public servants should be the accepted operating environment and fears about a lessening of frank and candid advice correspondingly diminished.'
- B) The decision maker states, "Disclosure would undermine the confidence and trust in the OAIC as a regulator to deal with matters it regulates in a sensitive and timely manner."
- i. 'Access to the document could result in embarrassment to the Commonwealth Government, or cause a loss of confidence in the Commonwealth Government' is an irrelevant factor as described in s 11B(4) of the FOI Act and therefore was incorrectly considered in the public interest test.
- C) The decision maker states, "Disclosure would reasonably be expected to delay the OAIC's consideration of, and ability to, take further regulatory action in response to an eligible data breach if entities are reluctant to provide timely, full and frank information if their respective identities may be disclosed."
- i) As previously stated, government agencies should start with the assumption that public servants are obliged by their position to always provide robust and frank advice and that obligation will not be diminished by the transparency of government activities.
- D) The decision maker states, "In case of a breach which meets the requisite threshold of 'serious harm', entities regulated by the Privacy Act are required to notify individuals affected by an

eligible data breach of the nature of the breach, inclusive of the type of information captured in their reporting to the OAIC."

- i. This is not relevant to the public interest test.
- ii. I note that the decision-maker explains that individuals directly affected by data breaches are notified of the breach, however, the public interest extends beyond individual impact. Data breaches have systemic consequences, such as undermining public trust in government agencies or exposing vulnerabilities in critical infrastructure. By disclosing agency names, the public can engage in informed discussions about these broader implications and advocate for policy changes to improve data security.
- 2.3 The public interest in transparency and accountability outweighs any potential harm to the OAIC's operations. Given the high level of public concern about data breaches and the importance of government transparency, the public interest in knowing which agencies are responsible for these breaches is significant. This interest outweighs any speculative harm to the OAIC's operations. This information is crucial for informed public debate, holding agencies accountable, and assessing the effectiveness of government data protection measures. The OAIC's role is to protect the privacy of Australians, and this includes providing them with the information they need to make informed decisions about their interactions with government agencies.
- 3. The decision-maker states, "As outlined in my decisions above, in my view based on the information before me at this time, I have concerns that disclosure of the nature and specific details of the information in a public forum such as via Right to Know, is likely to prejudice the abilities of these agencies in responding to the data breaches, and the OAIC's ability to gather similar information to assess these breaches in the future."
- i) The forum of an FOI request is irrelevant to the decision to deny access to information. FOI applicants have the right to publish disclosed information, and the disclosed documents become accessible to the public via the OAIC's disclosure log.

I am prepared to escalate this matter to the AAT if necessary. Therefore, I respectfully request that this internal review be conducted by a more senior decision-maker, such as a Principal or Senior Officer.

In cases where agencies objected to the release of their information in this document, these objections and submissions were considered on a case-by-case basis against the circumstances of that particular agency and data breach. Where information was considered exempt following an objection, the relevant agency had either requested that certain information be held in confidence when completing the NDB form and/or the agency was not required to notify the OAIC of that particular data breach (for example, where an exemption applies or where serious harm was not likely to occur). Neither of these circumstances applied to 3 22 which was why I decided we did not have sufficient information available to justify an exemption.

The attached document was released on 25 September 2024 and will be published on the OAIC's disclosure log shortly.

We apologise for not responding sooner regarding your question on timeframes. It was not possible to extend the consultation or decision timeframe, and due to the volume of agencies we have been consulting with on this matter, we are only able to update agencies on our final decision today.








CSIRO's FOI Team can confirm that we have no concerns with the proposed release, which would effectively identify CSIRO (and OAIC matter number) in association with one row entry in the document (without disclosing the substantive detail of the relevant breach).

CSIRO also notes that the OAIC is considering the submissions of each consulted entity on their merits. We accept that this is the correct approach. CSIRO simply submits that, should it transpire that only CSIRO, or a small number of entities, are to be disclosed in the document, all entities should instead remain redacted on the basis that bringing attention to only one entity, or a few select entities, would likely cause a distorted level of attention to those entities and unreasonably affect their operations. Of course, on the understanding that the majority of entities which have responded have not objected, we think it unlikely that this will be an issue.
